Visiting Parlors bring joy

We have been so blessed by our visiting parlors. These small cottages have provided a warm cozy place where residents and loved ones can safely visit in privacy, unhindered by the need for masks. A Plexiglas barrier divides the room and a speaker system between the two areas promotes better communication.

The parlors were speedily built this fall by our handy maintenance team with assistance from volunteers and crews from Leman Builders and P-L Construction.

If you would like to schedule a visit in a visiting parlor, please schedule with the Fairview Haven receptionist. (The receptionist is available daily from 5 AM-5 PM.)

Visits are scheduled at the top of each hour. Please plan to arrive 15 minutes early as you will need to screen in at the front desk. You will then have an opportunity for a 45-minute visit. In the 15 minutes between visits, the visiting parlor is sanitized.

The life enrichment team usually serves as "hosts" for the visiting par-

lors, assisting residents and sanitizing between visits.

Following is a touching perspective from Dixie Steidinger, Life Enrichment Director:

"Visits in the Parlor ... Some of us thought visiting in a shed on the patio would not be so great. Let me tell you we were so wrong, wrong beyond words.

"Let me share the beauty of what I have seen in the visiting parlor. A husband and wife sharing a meal, tears running down the husband's face with joy to see his wife. Grandpas and grandmas watching great-grandchildren or grandchildren playing. Friends visiting and sharing ice cream and cookies together as they have previously for years.


"Today was one of my most special and memorable times. A dear resident who isn't able to communicate verbally had a special visit from her daughter. At the sight of her daughter, the resi-

During the COVID pandemic and the social unrest of 2020, Fairview Haven recognized some vulnerabilities on our campus that we, as administration, felt should be addressed. For example, since the start of COVID, we have been forced to screen all traffic coming into our buildings. All parties (team members, families, etc.) are now required to enter the building at the main entrance. This has created a major bottleneck in our main living room, thus adding safety concerns. Our current entry system would not pass building or fire codes. Added to these safety issues is the fact that our front door allows a nice cold draft every time it is opened.

Due to these concerns, we have little choice but to revamp our main entrance. The state has given approval for this modification and work has begun. Your contributions to the building fund help us maintain a safe and comfortable environment for those we serve.

Just as we do in our own homes, Fairview Haven will continue to have a need to upgrade our building. Along with rising costs to provide the excellent care that our community has come to expect, we will continue to be a needy organization. For this reason, we feel incapable of expressing adequate thanks to God and our many generous supporters. From meals to encouraging

notes, to prayer, to timely donations, we are deeply thankful for each contributor.

It has been a very challenging year for our residents and team at Fairview Haven. Yet, one thing has not changed and, in fact, has become more evident to our team. 


