As you might imagine, our work has been more difficult in recent years because of the pandemic. Sometimes the difficulty can lead to conflict and disunity.


But we were quite encouraged recently when our administrator left for a week in Florida. No, having him

Happy 100th Birthday, Marjorie!

Marjorie Mishler celebrated her 100th birthday on February 11!

Born February 11, 1922, Marjorie Estelle (Lewis) Mishler was the oldest child of Franklin and Velma (Young) Lewis. She had six siblings.

Marge's father worked for Funk Brothers Seed Company in Bloomington. As the oldest in the family, Marge's memories of growing up are mostly of helping her mother with the new babies in the family.

She attended several different elementary schools and graduated from Normal Community High School in 1941. She says, "I loved school and would've liked to go to college." She especially liked studying history.

Marge got to know Ray Mishler when they were in high school. Later, they got together through mutual friends and began dating. After Ray enlisted in the Air Force, they were married on Nov. 25, 1944 in the Park Methodist Parsonage in Bloomington.

Ray took his basic training in Amarillo, TX. Ray wanted be a fighter pilot and trained on B29s in Albuquerque, NM and Colorado Springs, CO. He was one of a select few who passed the cadet training, but by that time, there was no longer a need for pilots, so he went through radio training at Scott Field in St. Louis. He then served as a radio operator on a B29 crew.

Marge joined him when he was stationed in Colorado. After Ray was discharged in 1946, they took a trip to Wyoming to visit family, before they returned to Illinois.

The Mishlers settled down on a farm near Carlock. They started out life together in a log cabin, built by Ray, his brother and his landlord. Because lumber was scarce during and after the war years, the men felled logs from the timber near the Mackinaw River and built the tiny cabin on the land owned by their landlord. Although in disrepair, the cabin can still be seen today, located near East White Oak Bible Church.

After Ray and Marge lived five years on that farm, the landlord wanted to turn over his farm to his recently married daughter and her husband. So, in 1951, the Mishlers moved to the Fairbury area. They farmed south of town for 40 years, where they raised cattle, hogs and grain. They loved being outdoors and working together on the farm. Ray also worked for the ASCS office and Honegger's mill.

Ray and Marge were blessed with three children: Linda (John) Gathman of Longmont, CO; Roger (Nancy) Mishler of El Paso and Robert Mishler of Champaign. They have two grandsons: Christopher Gathman and Ryan Mishler.

The Mishlers enjoyed memorable traveling opportunities over the years, including an Alaskan cruise and a trip out west to Glacier National Park, Lake Louise, the West Coast and California. They went to Texas several times and wintered in Florida for four years. While in Florida, they were eyewitnesses to history as they observed firsthand the explosion of the Challenger space

shuttle.

Sewing was Marge's favorite hobby. She created many clothes for her daughter, including her wedding dress. She

also did some quilting, most notably a Tree of Life quilt which consisted of 900 appliqued pieces. Marge also belonged to CLSC (Chatauqua Literary and Scientific Circle) for many years. The Mishlers have also been involved with their church, the First United Methodist Church in Fairbury.

After 40 years of living on the farm, the Mishlers lived in Fairbury for 23 years. In 2015, they became some of our friendly neighbors in the Fairview Haven community. Ray passed away on Oct. 29, 2021.

We are happy to have Marge living in Fairview Suites where she shares her smiles and positive outlook with us all.

Sometimes I feel like I don't fit in the same way other people do. Sometimes I feel like there is a group who maybe doesn't really want me there. Sometimes I wonder why I wasn't invited. Sometimes I walk up to a circle of people and I don't know whether to force my way in or to be awkward hanging around on the outside, waiting until I can leave and go home to the safety of my sofa.

Circles are great if you're on the inside. But circles can be awfully cruel if you're left on the outskirts, looking for a way to get inside.

They can be exclusive. They can be exhausting. They can be cliquish. They are far, far too common.

Stop building circles and build a U. Leave room for everyone. Make a way so anyone can walk up and feel like they have a place to stand.

Leave room for good people who look different than you, who like different things than you, who come from different places than you. Differences were never made to divide us. They were made to build us and to teach us, to fill in the gaps where our own gifts come up short.

Have your few trusted friends. Keep them close and spend time with them. Share your secrets with them. You can't be best friends with everyone.

But you can notice everyone. You can make room for everyone. You can be kind and generous and thoughtful and sympathetic to everyone. You can smile to everyone. You can make eye contact with everyone. You can probably even offer a simple 'hello' to everyone.

When you are at an event or any public setting, lift your eyes and look for the lonely. Chat with the new. Invite the introverts who will never invite themselves. Hug the hurting. Make room for more.

If you've ever felt that excruciating feeling of walking into a new place, of being surrounded with new faces, of being left out of group texts, of being excluded, don't let those experiences go to waste. Turn it around and use them for something good.

Use it to recognize the hurting among you. Use it to recognize the lonely. Use it to recognize the left out. And then use it to reach out with an invite, or reach out a hand or some kind of nice gesture.

Its not an easy thing to do—getting out of your comfort zone, getting over yourself enough to help someone else, getting out your saw and your hammer and nails right there in the middle of a crowd to build a bigger table. It's not easy. If it was easy, everyone would do it.

We're all guilty. We've all done it at some point. We've all been unaware. So there is no purpose in being anary and there definitely isn't any purpose in tearing people down for **CONTINUED ON PAGE 8**

Thoughts from Dave's Desk ...

We are thankful to report that Monday, February 14 was 14 days with no new positive COVID test results at Fairview Haven! This means that we are done with our outbreak – at least for the moment. We are thankful that only one resident in the FVH care center tested positive for COVID during this outbreak. Our team did an amazing job of mitigating the spread of the virus and, while we were in a LONG outbreak with lots of cases among our team members, we had very few acquired while at work.

We don't know when or if this pandemic will ever end, but we continue to keep our eyes up and trust in our Lord to carry us through whatever is asked of us.

In addition to the COVID crisis, we are experiencing a staffing shortage like we've never seen at Fairview Ha-

ven. Our team is weary. They are all working so hard to maintain our high standards for quality of care.

I would like to ask for the following prayers:

- 1. That God will sustain our current staff by giving them strength to endure whatever comes their way.
- 2. That God will call individuals to the ministry at Fairview Haven. We are in need of applicants for just about any area. Is God calling you?
- 3. That God will protect our home (residents and team) from contracting the COVID virus. We're thankful that the numbers are on the downward trend again, but we still have many regulations to watch.
- 4. That God would give me and the management team wisdom to lead this team through the many challenges of COVID regulations, staffing shortages

and financial hardship.

We're thankful for the recent news release that Governor Pritzker intends to drop the mask mandate in Illinois on February 28.

As a reminder, at this point, this does NOT apply to healthcare facilities. Our team will continue to mask for source control at this time, and anyone entering our building will have the same requirement. Nothing will be changing at Fairview Haven until further notice.

Residents can welcome visitors, with the following protocols:

- -Anyone entering the building must be screened in at the front desk.
- -While visiting, visitors must remain in the resident's room (or designated visiting area) and are not permitted to visit in common areas.
- -Visitors must wear a face covering during the entire visit unless they are actively
